SAFETY INSTRUCTIONS

Quick User's Manual

Referring to the front panel here below, the description of the DPV-260 functions with reference to the control buttons and encoders.



● **Getting Started**

As soon as the DPV-260 is turned ON, on the LCD will appear in sequence the Device Model Name

and the Control Sw Version

Xover 2 x 6

The above screens are temporary ones and after a while they'll disappear leaving the place to the "Default Screen".

If no presets are available yet, or if the DPV-260 has been reset so to rescue the factory preset, then the "Default Screen" will be the following

2 x 3 WAY X-OVER

Otherwise, if the DPV-260 was running a selected preset, then the "Default Screen" will display the preset's name, i.e. if the last preset loaded was "Stage1 2x3", then the screen will be the following

Stage1 2 x 3

● **Encoders and ENTER, ESC buttons**

The DPV-260 is equipped with 3 Relative Encoders, “NAV/PAR1”, “PAR2” and “PAR3”, used for the “screen navigation” during the several operations allowed by the powerful user interface and editing section of the processor.

Together with the 3 encoders, the buttons “ENTER” and “ESC” allow to perform the all editing operations available on the DPV-260.

The 3 encoders allow then the user to navigate within the screen for the selection of sub-menus, pages and for the selection of parameters and values to be assigned to them during the several editing operations to be used for navigating, and the “ENTER” and “ESC” buttons allow the euser to confirm or NOT confirm the operations performed by the encoders.

● **UTILITY, A1/A2 and 1/2/3/4/5/6 buttons**

The all editing possibilities of the DPV-260 can be accessed through the use of the UTILITY button, for entering the sub-menus allowing the User to set the general characteristics of the Processor, the buttons A1 and A2, allowing to the User to enter the Editing Menus of the Processor’s Input Channels and the buttons 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6, allowing the User to enter the Editing Menus of the Processor’s Output Channels.

Particularly, the A1 and A2 buttons so as the 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 buttons have a double functions accessible with different “push timings”

Actually A1 and A2, if pushed quickly without maintaining them pressed (but they have to be pressed for at least 100ms), allow to MUTE or UN-MUTE the Input Channels 1 and 2.

The MUTE condition of the Input Channel is shown by the “ACTIVE” led which will turn ON.

When the “ACTIVE” led is OFF, then the related Input Channel is UN-MUTED.

Pushing the A1 and A2 buttons and maintaining them pressed for almost 2 sec, it is possible to enter the Editing Menu for the Input Channels (see later for the Input Channel Editing details)

Also for the 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6 buttons, if pushed quickly without maintaining them pressed (but they have to be pressed for at least 100ms), allow to MUTE or UN-MUTE the Output Channels 1,2 ,3 ,4 ,5 and 6.

The MUTE condition of the Output Channel is shown by the “MUTE” led which will turn ON.

When the “MUTE” led is OFF, then the related Output Channel is UN-MUTED.

Pushing the 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 buttons and maintaining them pressed for almost 2 sec, it is possible to enter the Editing Menu for the Output Channels (see later for the Input Channel Editing details)

● **DPV-260 Menus and Sub-Menus block schemes**

Starting from the “Default Screen” coming after turning On the DPV-260, i.e. the following if getting started with the factory preset

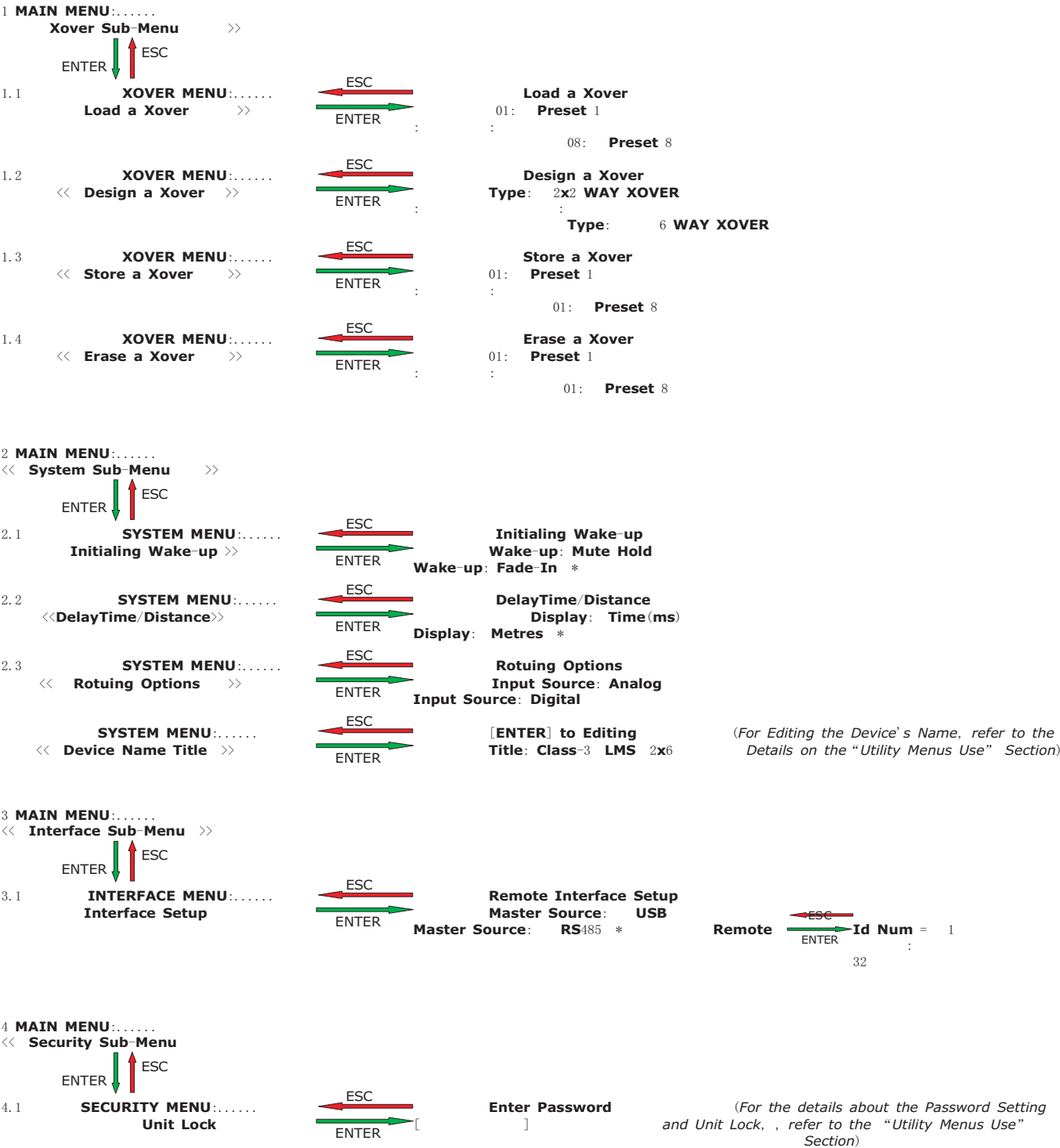

● **Menu “MAIN” [accessed pushing the “UTILITY” button]**

From the “Default Screen” , it is possible access the “MAIN” menu pushing the “UTILITY” button and the Sub-Menus pages can be selected just rotating clockwise and counter-clockwise the “NAV/PAR1” encoder.

Once selected the sub-menu page, using the “ENTER” button can be accessed the Sub-Menus pages, again “scrollable” using the “NAV/PAR1” encoder and accessible for the parameters’ editing pushing again the “ENTER’ button.

Through the “ESC” button, it is any time possible to go back to the action and page preceding the “ENTER” button use.

Once inside the Sub-Menus pages, the several options can be scrolled and using the PAR2 or PAR3 encoders and selected/confirmed pushing the “ENTER” button.

Note: in the all pages’ options, the all possible selections appear with an **asterisc “* ”** aside the option’s definition, so to indicate the NOT CURRENTLY RUNNING Options.

The Currently selected and running options HAVE NOT THE ASTERISC aside the option’s definition.

Once a not currently running option, displayed with the asterisc aside, is entered (pushing the “ENTER” button), then the asterisc will disappear and the shown option will take place as the currently running one.

Xover Sub-menu – this sub-menu allows to access several operations related to the DPV-260 operative mode and to manage the presets storable and recallable with the Unit.

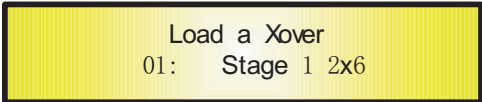
From the “Xover sub-menu” , just pushing the “ENTER” button and then using the “NAV/PAR1” encoder for sliding the pages, the following pages can be accessed

- **Load a Xover:** page allowing the Loading of a preset, of 8 allowed, already stored in the DPV-260 memory.

From this page and rotating the “PAR2” or “PAR3” encoder, it is possible to slide the all current AVAILABLE presets and their location.

If NO PRESETS are stored yet, the screen will advise that “no presets are available” and automatically the system will jump back to the “Default” screen.

If Presets are available, then they’ll be shown in the “Load a Xover” page

Using the “PAR2” or “PAR3” encoder it is possible to select the wanted preset to recall.

Pushing furtherly the “ENTER” button, the “ **[Enter] for Recall.**” page will be entered, showing the selected preset for recalling

Confirming the preset pushing again the “ENTER” button, will force the DPV-260 to load as current preset the selected one and the following transitory screen will appear

Once loaded the new preset, the DPV-260 will exit the “Load a Xover” page automatically and the above screen will disappear leaving the place to the “Default” one which will show the name of the loaded preset and now the current one performed by the DPV-260

Note: any time is possible to quit the recalling action just pushing the “ESC” button.

- **Design a Xover:** page allowing to define the operative mode of the DPV-260, from a selection of 5 options.

2x2 WAY XOVER... in this operative mode, the DPV-260 is performing a 2 Input to 6 Outputs X-Over, where the 2 Inputs are automatically assigned to the Outputs as follow:
Input A to the Outputs 1/2.

Input B to the Outputs 3/4

the Sum of the 2 Inputs (A+B) to the Outputs 5/6

2x3 WAY XOVER... in this operative mode, the DPV-260 is performing a 2 Input to 6 Outputs X-Over, where the 2 Inputs are automatically assigned to the Outputs as follow:
Input A to the Outputs 1/2/3

Input B to the Outputs 4/5/6

4 WAY XOVER... in this operative mode, the DPV-260 is performing a 2 Input to 6 Outputs X-Over, where the 2 Inputs are automatically assigned to the Outputs as follow:
Input A to the Outputs 1/2/3/4

Input B or Sum of the 2 Inputs (A+B) to the Outputs 5/6

5 WAY XOVER... in this operative mode, the DPV-260 is performing a 2 Input to 6 Outputs X-Over, where the 2 Inputs are automatically assigned to the Outputs as follow:
Input A to the Outputs 1/2/3/4/5

Input B or Sum of the 2 Inputs (A+B) to the Outputs 6

6 WAY XOVER... in this operative mode, the DPV-260 is performing a 2 Input to 6 Outputs X-Over, where the 2 Inputs are automatically assigned to the Outputs as follow:
Input A to the Outputs 1/2/3/4/5/6

From this page and rotating the “PAR2” or “PAR3” encoder, it is possible to slide the all available X-Over operative modes presets.

The “Design a Xover” page will appear as follow

Design a Xover
Type: 2x3 WAY XOVER

Once selected the desired operative mode for the DPV-260, to load it it is enough to push the “ENTER” button.

In the case of the following presetted operative modes “2x2 WAY XOVER”, “2x3 WAY XOVER” and “6 WAY XOVER,” pushing the “ENTER” button to load them, will take to the following screen, asking for confirming the will to load the selected operative mode

New Xover
[ENTER] to confirm

And if confirmed the will to load the selected operative mode, the DPV-260 will be settled accordingly.

In the case, instead, of the following presetted operative modes “4 WAY XOVER” and “5 WAY XOVER”, pushing the “ENTER” button will be entered a page asking to assign the Input for the remaining Output channels (the Outputs 5&6, for the “4 WAY XOVER” and the Output 6 for the “5 WAY XOVER”).

Design a Xover
Output 5&6 Source: A+B

Once assigned the Inputs for the above operative modes, then pushing again the “ENTER” button the system will go ahead as previously described.

As soon as the operative mode will be loaded, the system will exit automatically the “MAIN MENU” to jump back to a screen displaying the loaded operative mode.

For the “4 WAY XOVER” operative mode, i.e., the screen will be the following

4 WAY X-OVER + 2

- **Store a Xover:** page allowing the Storing of a new preset in the DPV-260 memory. From this page and rotating the “PAR2” or “PAR3” encoder, it is possible to slide the all current presets, showing the already existent presets’ names, or the available empty (identified by “Empty Program”) locations for new presets. If No presets are stored yet, the “Store a Xover” page will appear as follow

Store a Xover
01: Empty Program

If we are ready to store an edited configuration of the DPV-260, we just need to select the location we want to use for storing the preset, selecting the location from 8 **available** through the “PAR2” or “PAR3” encoder.

Once selected the location (i.e. the location number 1), for editing the Configuration Name it is necessary to push again the “ENTER” button for entering the “**Set Memory Name**” page.

In this page the User can edit an **up to 16 Characters** Preset’s Name just using the “PAR2” or “PAR3” encoder to chose the character and the “NAV/PAR1” encoder to move between the 16 available locations for the name’s characters positioning.

The current position of the cursor for the characters’ entering is shown by a “blinking underscore” .

During this editing phase, the display is as follow (i.e. assigning to the preset the “Stage 1 2x6” name to the location 01)

Set Memory Name.
01: Stage 1 2x6

Once chosen the name for the preset, to store it need to push again the “ENTER” button. The above action will enter the “ **Enter to Store** ” page, which will show the selected location for the preset and the final edited name for it. If anything is matching our desires, pushing again the “ENTER” button, the preset will be stored in the selected location with the chosen name and the following transitory screen will take place on the LCD

Stored to Memory.
01: Stage 1 2x6

Once the preset is stored, the above screen will disappear leaving the place to the “Default” one. The “Store a Xover” menu will be exited automatically and if the current loaded preset on the X-Over was “Stage 1 2x2” , then the screen will be the following

Stage 1 2x2

If during the Preset Storing phase an already occupied location is chosen once in the “**Store a Xover**” page, then before to access the “**Set Memory Name**” page, after having pushed the “ENTER” button, a further page is entered called “[ENTER] to Overwrite” asking to confirm the will to Overwrite with the new Preset the one currently stored in the selected location.

If pushed then again the “ENTER” button, the DPV-260 will go ahead with the “**Set Memory Name**” page and then with the previously described steps until the preset storing process end.

Note: any time is possible to quit the storing action just pushing the “ESC” button.

- **Erase a Xover:**page allowing to Erase a preset already stored in the DPV-260 memory. From this page and rotating the “PAR2” or “PAR3” encoder, it is possible to slide the all current AVAILABLE presets and their location. If NO PRESETS are stored yet, the screen will advise that “no presets are available” and automatically the system will jump back to the “Default” screen.

If Presets are available, then they’ll be shown in the “Erase a Xover” page

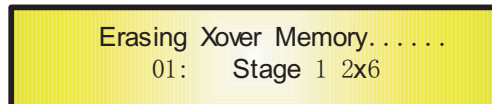

Using the “PAR2” or “PAR3” encoder it is possible to select the preset that has to be erased.

Pushing furtherly the “ENTER” button, the “ [Enter] to Erase.” page will be entered, showing the selected preset will be erased

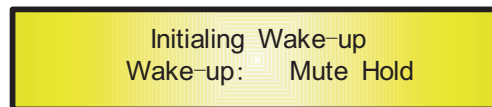
Once erased the preset, the DPV-260 will exit the “Erase a Xover” page automatically and the above screen will disappear leaving the place to the “Default” .

Note: any time is possible to quit the recalling action just pushing the “ESC” button.

System Sub-menu - this sub-menu allows to access several operations related to the DPV-260 Start Up and General Configuration.

From the “System sub-menu”, just pushing the “ENTER” button and then using the “NAV/PAR1” encoder for sliding the pages, the following pages can be accessed

- **Initialing Wake-up:** page allowing to chose the way of Turning On the DPV-260 after switched the Unit ON.
From this page and rotating the “PAR2” or “PAR3” encoder, it is possible to between to options: “Mute Hold” and” Fade In” .



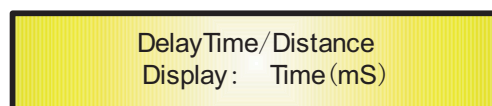
The currently NOT running option will be displayed with an “asterisc *” beside the option name, and the running option without.

After selected the desired option, it can be made active just pushing the “ENTER” button. In details, the 2 available options are leading the DPV-260 to the following behaviour after turned ON:

MUTE HOLD...when this option is active, after Turning ON the DPV-260, the all Outputs, independently from their status before to turn OFF the Unit, will be MUTED automatically, so to inhibit the DPV-260 to have active Outputs after having been turned ON.

FADE-In... when this option is active, after Turning ON the DPV-260, the all Outputs not previously muted, before to turn OFF the Unit, will be activated and allowed to “sound” but the activation is performed through a “Volume Ramp”, avoiding sudden sound to come.

- **DelayTime/Distance:** this page allows to select the “Measure’s Unit” to be used to express the Delays: **Time** (in milliseconds “ms”) or **Meters**
Once entered the “DelayTime/Distance” page using the “ENTER” button, rotating the “PAR2” or “PAR3” encoder, it is possible to select then the Measure’s Unit for expressing the Delay, which will be confirmed entering it just “pushing” the “ENTER” button.
The screen allowing the Measure’s Unit for the Delay selection, is the following (i.e. when the Delay is expressed in “ms”)



- **Program Mute Option:** this page allows to decide if the “Mute Status” for each output channel has to be stored together with the all other parameters creating a preset or if it has to be an independent parameter being everytime ON once turned on the DPV-260.
Once entered the “program Mute Option” page using the “ENTER” button, rotating the “PAR2” or “PAR3” encoder, it is possible to select the desired option for the Mute Status:
OFF: the Mute on the all output channels will be Activated any time on the DPV-260 will be recalled a User’s Preset.
ON: the Mute on the all output channels will be Activated or Not on each channel independently, depending from its last Status before to save as preset the configuration of the DPV-260.

The screen allowing the Program Mute Option setting, is the following (i.e. when the Program Mute Option is set on OFF)

- **Routing Options:** the DPV-260 Processor is equipped with 2 Analog Inputs (Balanced Female XLR) and a stereo S/PDIF Digital Input (RCA connector).
The “Routing Options” page allows
Once entered the “Routing Options” page using the “ENTER” button, rotating the “PAR2” or “PAR3” encoder, it is possible to select the Main Inputs for the DPV-260, allowing the User to choose between the Analog ones or the S/PDIF Digital ones.
The selection can be confirmed “pushing” the “ENTER” button.
The screen allowing the Input Selection, is the following (i.e. when the Analog Input is the selected one)

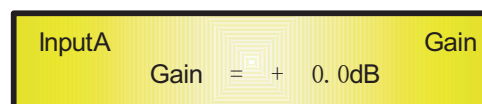

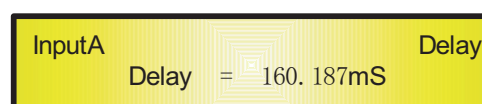

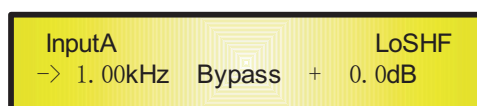

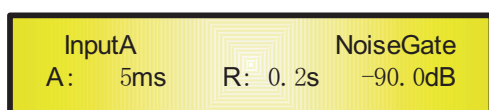

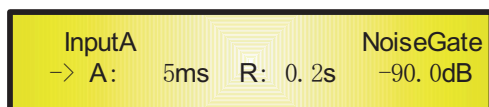

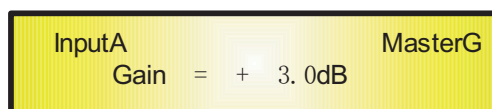

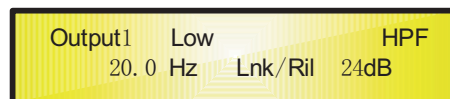

“Attack Time [A]” : the range of the selectable Limiter’s Attack Time is going from 5ms to 200ms by steps of 1ms from 5ms to 20ms, 5ms from 20ms to 30ms, 10ms from 30ms to 100ms, 20ms from 100ms to 200ms.

The Limiter’s Attack Time can be accessed rotating the “NAV/PAR1” encoder.

“Release Time [R]” : the range of the selectable Limiter’s Release Time is going from 0.2s to 2s by steps of 0.1s and can be accessed rotating the “PAR2” encoder.

“Intervent Threshold ” : the range of the selectable Limiter’s Threshold is going from +20dB (Limiter not active) to -10.0dB by steps of 0.5 dB and can be accessed rotating the “PAR3” encoder.

Note1 : once selected the desired options using the 3 encoders, they are automatically accepted as current ones during the selection and stored in the LMS-2x6 system status once left the page.

Note2 : to exit the editing filter’s page it is enough to push the “ESC” button.

Polarity page - from this page it is possible to set the Output Channels Polarity, just using the “PAR1” or “PAR2” .

The polarity can be “Normal” or “Inverted” (which means rotated of 180 Degrees).

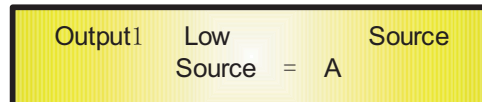

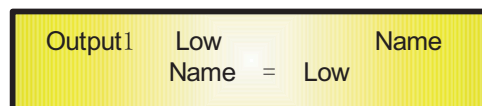


The Input for the edited Output channel can be selected rotating either “PAR2” or “PAR3” .

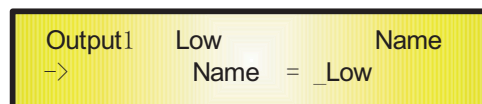
Name page – from this page it is possible to assign a NAME to the edited Output Channel.

The Screenshot of the “Name” page is the following (i.e. When the name is “Low” for the Output Channel 1)



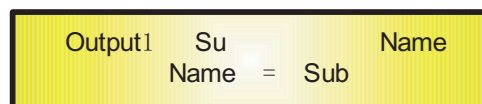
To Edit a new Name, push “ENTER” button and the following page will appear
